




WCHA PLAYER OF THE YEAR

HISTORY OF THE AWARD

since 1960, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association has annually honored a conference member team player deemed either as the league's Most Valuable Player or as the league's Player of the Year.

From 1960 to 1981, the league's Most Valuable Player Award was administered by The Denver Post. The first winner of the MVP honor was forward Jerry Walker of Denver.

Since 1981, the WCHA's top individual on-ice award has been voted on by different combinations of conference-member coaches, student-athletes, sports information directors, and media.

In 1992, a vote of conference head coaches changed the official designation of the award from 'WCHA Most Valuable Player' to 'WCHA Player of the Year' in order to better describe the honor.

A total of three players in 52 seasons have won the league's top on-ice honor more than once. They are goaltender Murray McLachlan of University of Minnesota (1969 and 1970), forward Doug Palazzari of Colorado College (1972 and 1974), and forward Brian Bonin of University of Minnesota (1995 and 1996).



hirty-one victories overall and a trip to the NCAA Frozen Four. Regular-season co-champions in the WCHA. Another Hobey Baker Award winner. Four first-team All-Americans.

That was 2004-05. It's a tough act to follow.

However, in Scott Owens' seven years as head coach at Colorado College, seldom has the outlook appeared brighter than it does heading into the 2005-06 season.

"My biggest concern," says Owens, "is that the guys don't think that they don't have to work hard this season to achieve what they did last year. Sometimes you think you're better than you are, and you have to go in with a fresh new approach and attitude. We need to understand that we value the experience we gained last year but that it's a new season, with different opponents, a new chemisty and dynamics."


No fewer than 21 players return from a team that reached the NCAA semifinals, including five senior forwards who combined for 99 goals and 210 points. First-team All-Americans Marty Sertich (27-37–64) and Brett Sterling (34-29–63) head the pack, Sertich having wonthe Hobey Baker Memorial Award after claiming a national scoring title and Sterling having led the country with his 34 goals.

Toss in Joey Crabb (16-16–32), Trevor Frischmon (10-16–26) and Aaron Slattengren (12-13–25), and you're talking about a group that was credited with the game-winning goal in 20 of CC's 31 victories. Sterling alone had seven GWG, Sertich and Slattengren four apiece. And it was Frischmon who struck for the game winner, his second tally of the game, in the third period of a dramatic come-from-behind triumph over Michigan in the NCAA quarterfinals.

"If we can get 35 points out of Crabb, I'll be very happy," Owens says. "I think he can pick up on his five-on-five goal scoring, and I think Slattengren is capable of having a bigger year than he had in 2004-05 – he's got 70 career points in three seasons. And I think that Frischmon has played back-to-back excellent years. If he can match what he's done, it'll help us. There's a little bit of wiggle room in there, but those three have had awfully good careers up to this point."

The list of talented veterans – up front, in net and at the blue line – doesn't stop there.

The Tigers also bring back junior defensive partners Brian Salcido (7-23-30) and Lee Sweatt (3-25-28), who enjoyed breakout sophomore seasons in 2004-05, as well as second-year winger Jimmy Kilpatrick (8-17-25). Those three, along with the aforementioned five seniors, provide Owens with his top eight point producers from a year ago – two defensemen and six forwards who totaled just under 300 points (293) to

go along with 117 goals.

All told, this season's returning players scored 146 of the team's 160 goals (91.3%) and earned 368 of its 421 points (87.4%) in 2004-05. Offense should not be a problem in 2005-06, especially since seven other experienced forwards also are eager to pick their game up a notch.

"As outstanding as our program has been," says Owens, "we've never had this much quality depth at the forward position."

The group includes juniors J.P. Brunkhorst, Braydon Cox, Brandon Polich and Scott Thauwald, as well as sophomores James Brannigan, Scott McCulloch, and Derek Patrosso. The four juniors have logged 229 games their first two years. Thauwald scored seven goals in 22 games a year ago before missing the second half of the campaign with a knee injury. McCulloch, meanwhile, had four talies in just 11 outings before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury. He, Brannigan and Patrosso, along with Kilpatrick, all hope to make a major impact as sophomores.

Rounding out CC's talented crop of for-

wards in '05-06 will be highly-touted freshmen Chad Rau and Andreas Vlassopoulos. Rau, the United States Hockey League's Rookie of the Year last season, finished second in the entire USHL with 71 points (31g,40a) for Des Moines. Vlassopoulos comes to the Tigers from the U.S. National Under-18 Team, for which he contributed 23 points (4g,19a) in 46 games in '04-05.

Between the pipes, junior Matt Zaba returns as the heir appaarent to two-time All-American Curtis McElhinney, who graduated last spring after posting an incredible 62-16-8 (.747) record the last four years. But Zaba enters his third season with a career saves percentage (.913) even better than McElhinney's (.912), as well as a stingy 2.35 goals-against average to go with 20 victories to date. Fellow junior Chris Kawano, who has shown vast improvement over the course of his first two seasons, and promising freshman Drew O'Connell also will compete for playing time.

O'Connell was named to the USHL All-Rookie Team after posting six shutouts with Waterloo in '04-05.
